
### CERTIFIED RECORD OF LAND CORNER MONUMENTATION

### HISTORY OF ORIGINAL CORNER ESTABLISHMENT:

The corner was originally established by Herman D. Gradon under GLO contract No. 452 dated June 6, 1882. The Surveyor General Record states: Set a basalt stone 22x10x8 ins 16 ins in the ground, for 1/4 sec cor, marked 1/4 on N. Face, from which

marked 1/4 on N. Face, from which A pine 22 ins diam bears N30 °E, 153 lks dist., marked 1/4 S.B.T. A pine 14 ins diam bears S65 °W, 85 lks dist., marked 1/4 S.B.T.

U.S. Forest Service corner records indicate that this corner was searched for in September of 1986 with no monument or accessories found.



I found no subsequent record of monumentation in the Union County survey records.



# DESCRIPTION OF MONUMENT AND ACCESSORIES I ESTABLISHED TO PERPETUATE THE ORIGINAL LOCATION OF THIS CORNER:

At the proportionate position I set a 2 1/4" Brass Cap on a 1 3/8"  $\times$  30" galvanized iron pipe 27" in the ground with a 24" collar of stone around it. I stamped the cap as shown below.

I marked four bearing trees. Each bearing tree has a 1 1/2" brass washer fastened between the letters B and T with a 2" PK nail. The washer is stamped WTS and 56295 LS. Measurements were taken to the dent in the head of the nail with a Trimble 5601 electronic total station. Bearings are based on the survey control for County Survey No. 032–2004.

A 13" Ponderosa Pine bears N24°00'29"W, 22:31', scribed 1/4 S5 BT.
A 14" Pondersa Pine bears N40°03'52"E, 34.41', scribed 1/4 S5 BT
A 12" Pondersa Pine bears S09°34'15"W, 39.62', scribed 1/4 S8 BT
A 12" Pondersa Pine bears S35°19'50"W, 54.09', scribed 1/4 S8 BT


## CERTIFIED RECORD OF LAND CORNER MONUMENTATION

U.S. Forest Service corner records indicate that this corner was searched for in September of 1986 with no monument or accessories found.



In survey 032-2004 I set a 2 1/4" Brass Cap on a 1 3/8" x 30" galvanized iron pipe at the proportionate point. I stamped the cap as shown under evidence found.

I marked four bearing trees. Each bearing tree has a 1 1/2" prass washer fastened between the letters B and T with a 2" PK nail. The washer is stamped WTS and 56295 LS.

Ponderosa Pine bears N24°00'29"W, 22.31', scribed 1/4 S5 BT. A 14" Pondersa Pine bears N40°03'52"E, 34.41', scribed 1/4 S5 BT A 12" Pont 1/4 S8 BT A 12" Pr A 12" Pr Pondersa Pine bears SO9°34'15"W, 39.62', scribed Pondersa Pine bears S35°19'50"W, 54.09', scribed

I found no subsequent record of monumentation in the Union County survey records.

#### DESCRIPTION OF CORNER EVIDENCE FOUND:


At the proportionate point I found the brass cap and the bearing trees as described in good condition.
At the true corner location I found the original basalt stone, 19" x 9" x 6", plainly marked 1/4 on its north face, tipped onto its east side. I found the rotted stump of the original northeast bearing tree, N30°E, 99.0'. There were no identifiable remains

the southwest bearing tree.

## DESCRIPTION OF MONUMENT AND ACCESSORIES I ESTABLISHED TO PERPETUATE THE ORIGINAL LOCATION OF THIS CORNER:

I cut the brass cap off of the monument I set at the proportionate point but left that pipe in place. I obliterated the scribing from the plazes of the two bearing trees in Section 5 and I remarked those faces with an "X". in place. and T

At the position of the original stone I set a 2 1/2" brass cap on a 1 3/8"  $\times$  30" galvanized iron pipe 24 inches into the ground to bedrock. I built a mound of earth and stone, 24" diameter to the top of the cap and marked the cap as shown below. I buried the original stone on the north side of the monument.


I marked two new bearing trees and held the two trees I previously set in Section 8. Each bearing tree has a 1 1/2" brass washer fastened between the letters B and T with a 2" PK nail. The washer is stamped WTS and 56295 LS. Measurements were taken to the dent in the head of the nail with a Trimble 5601 electronic total station. Bearings are based on the survey control for Union County Survey No. 032-2004. The correct bearing trees are now described as:

Ponderosa Pine bears N12°06'28"W. 43.54'. scribed A 14" Ponderosa Fine Doc. 1/4 S5 BT.
A 15" Pondersa Pine bears N48°08'47"E, 11.41', scribed 1/4 S5 BT
A 12" Pondersa Pine bears S21°09'40"W, 96.54', scribed 1/4 S8 BT
A 12" Pondersa Pine bears S6°49'06"W, 85.58', scribed A 12" Pondersa Pine bears S6°49'06"W, 85.58', scribed

The pipe from the previous monument I set bears S4°27'00"W, 46.04'.
